



Percentage of expenditure in funding: Ear moulds, repairs and subsidies over last six months

Percentage of expenditure in funding, ear moulds and repairs and subsidies over last 6 months (July 2023- December 2023)









Number of approved subsidies

By month: July 2015 - December 2024






Average subsidies requested per month






Percentage of subsidies requested by ethnicity As identified by assessors




Subsidy request by age group By financial year

Key observations-subsidy

There were a total of **34 new branches**/ business claiming in 2024 compared to 2023.

This equated to \$1.3 million expenditure in subsidies in 2024 just for these new businesses.


Majority receiving the subsidy are NZ European and over 65 – We have seen **growth in all age groups**.

3% are identified as Māori - we **have not seen any growth** in this, despite the range of schemes available.





Claims for hearing aids. July 2015 – December 2024 by month.






Funding expenditure Excluding repairs/moulds






Clients who accessed hearing aid funding

December 2024)






Requests by age group and ethnicity 2023/24 FY






Percentage of requests in funding criteria








Adult average price point

June 2017 - December 2024






Child average price point June 2017 – December 2024

In summary

- CSC is increasing, especially: Caring for a dependent person, in work, or seeking work.
- Childrens' requests seem to be decreasing slightly.
- Māori are accessing the Hearing Aid Funding scheme more than Subsidy scheme.





Disability Support Services - Update -

Hearing service budget – It's our role to ensure people receive what they need within the allocated budget.

Do we have any levers to keep within the budget?

- Are waitlist hearing aid requests based on highest need first?
- Could we release funding for children first, while adults wait?
- Could we release within a daily amount to ensure meet the budget?
- We could continue until budget is spent, stopping all processing until the new financial year (resulting in the same situation next year)
- We could look to reduce the average price target.



- Choose cost effective solutions (\$1300)
 - there are advanced and some premium hearing aids in this price range.
- Consider if the hearing aids can last longer than the replacement periods
- Ensure you are meeting the requirement of the Section 88 notice. For example subsidies need to be submitted once finalized. Credits on subsides should be very exceptional.
